



**ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER RE:
SURRENDERS FOR STRAIGHT TIME JAIL COMMITMENTS PREVIOUSLY
SCHEDULED TO COMMENCE BETWEEN 04/09/2020 AND 06/14/2020**

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the proclamations of a state of emergency by President Trump, Governor Newsom, and the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors, and at the request of El Dorado County Sheriff John D'Agostini, the Superior Court of El Dorado County issues the following administrative order:

For defendants who have been ordered to surrender to the jail to commence a straight time commitment between April 9, 2020 and June 14, 2020, the court issues the following order:

- 1) In order to reduce the risk of exposing the current jail population and jail staff to the COVID-19 virus, defendants who have been ordered to surrender to the jail to commence a straight time commitment between April 9, 2020 and June 14, 2020 must contact the jail on or before the date that their sentence is to commence, to extend their surrender date until after 06/14/2020.
- 2) The El Dorado County Jail staff are authorized to reschedule a defendant's straight time sentence which has been ordered to be commenced from 04/09/2020 to 06/14/2020 to commence on a date after 06/14/2020.
- 3) The El Dorado County Jail staff are ordered to provide the El Dorado County Superior Court department which imposed the sentence written documentation of the date and time of the rescheduled commitment.
- 4) If a defendant sentenced to commence a straight time commitment fails to reschedule his or her sentence and/or fails to report on the date and time ordered, the El Dorado County Jail staff are ordered to send a non compliance notice to the El Dorado County Superior Court department which imposed the sentence so that appropriate action can be taken.


If the behavior of the defendant in the community prior to sentencing creates a risk to public safety or to the personal safety of the victim of the offense, the court retains the right to make a specific remand order as to that defendant.

This order does not apply to sentences of defendants who are currently in custody, nor does it apply to remands from the courtroom after sentencing or remands for other reasons, such as failure to comply with the conditions of pretrial supervision.

This order does not apply to sentences being served out of county, or to sentences which are addressed by other administrative orders of the court, such as weekend/interval sentences.

IT IS SO ORDERED.
